STORIES BEHIND THE NAMES

The names of roses have always fascinated me. They intrigue us with hints of people (family, famous, infamous), explorers, wars, history, geography, and encourage us to find out the background to the naming. That is, they tell the stories of places, people and events which were meant to be remembered by the roses named after them.

Many reflect the colour which describes their bloom – for example;

Blush Rambler Apricot Nectar Crimson Glory
Brass Band Lavender Dream Scarlet Meidiland

Violette Blue Moon Pink Silk

Then there are those named after popular drinks;

Burgundy Tequila Sunrise Glenfiddich

Brandy Whisky

There are those novelty names which often do not have any reason;

Sexy Rexy Abracadabra Bobby Dazzler

Gold Bunny Brass Monkey Spunky

Kickapoo

Some received their name by accident, such as;

Keepit Just Joey

Then we have problems with too many names for the one rose – for example;

Parson's Pink has 19 others Slater's Crimson has 25 others

Or the reverse problem, that more than one rose ends up with the same name, such as;

Princess of Wales (4 different roses) (The) Queen Mother (3 Different roses)

Many modern roses have had the naming rights purchased by charity groups to raise funds. Some examples are;

Angela Rose Taylor Howard Florey Mother's Love
Mother and Daughter Red Cross The Children's Rose

With your permission, I will select a couple of roses each week and tell you the story behind their names. If you have a particular request, let me know.

I thought you might like some statistics about our stories. They started in 2001, when things were a little slack after pruning. We usually do not have them during the pruning season so that we can have maximum time in the Garden and we frequently stop during deadheading.

That leaves about six months of the year for stories. So twenty-six times a year for fourteen years gives over three hundred and sixty stories some from representatives of our suppliers, such as Neutrog and Felco and the rest from members of our own group. No wonder there have been a few repeats.
